## A Latino Committee Event Immigrant Civil Rights Challenges facing California and the Nation Thursday, May 4

John Trasviña '80, (Stanford Law '83) is the highest ranking Hispanic attorney at the U.S. Department of Justice and heads the only office in the federal government whose sole mission is to protect immigrant rights in the workplace. The nation's

## Includes Full Luncheon in Crew's Mess Visit a WWII Victory Ship Saturday, June 10

Welcome aboard one of America's last remaining Victory ships, as we visit the Red Oak Victory at Point Richmond at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 10th. A high point of the event will be a hot, full-course catered



luncheon served to Club members below decks in the actual crew's and guards' mess. Cost of the tour and luncheon is \$25

for adults, \$17.50 for kids under 14.

Most members are more familiar with WWII Liberty ships than with Victory ships, their successors. The Liberty ships, like San Francisco's Jeremiah O'Brien, were based on an 1879 British design, and, at only 11 knots, were chased and sunk by enemy subs almost faster than they could be produced. The Victory ships, which could run at 15 knots, went into service late in the war, in February of 1944. Richmond's Kaiser Shipyard could produce one in as little as 96 hours. The Red Oak is the only one of the 747 Victory ships still afloat, and is being restored under the auspices of the Richmond Museum.

Join fellow members the evening of May 18 at the University Club for a stimulating talk and give-and-take on what is one of the most profound issues of our day, the ethics, the legal and social issues, surrounding research into the human gene.
