Excitement filled the air as the John Harvard "Wisdom of the Ages Awards" were bestowed on the oldest and the youngest alumni present; the "Richard Henry Dana Intrepid Explorer Awards" were granted to the alumnus who traveled the farthest to attend the event, and to the one who traveled farthest to attend Harvard; and "The Towering Intellect Awards" were given in memory of John Kenneth Galbraith (6'8") and Milton Friedman (5'3"), both of whom passed away this year. Naturally, these last awards were bestowed on the tallest, and the shortest that stepped forward. (There was a spirited contest to determine the smallest, as shoes were kicked off, hairdos flattened, etc.).

But the highlight of the evening had to be the appearance of the Harvard Hat, a Beach-Blanket-Babylon style, six-foot wide replica of Harvard Yard. The hat, first created for the 350th anniversary of Harvard's founding, has been carefully hidden, and lovingly cared for, in the home of former HCSF

President John McGuckin, AB '68, JD '71, and was brought out for public viewing for the first time in twenty years.

The Harvard Book Prize program was started in 1910
by Harvard Alumni to encourage talented students to
apply to Harvard. Today the Prize is presented annually in more than 1900 high schools around the world.
A number of years ago, the Harvard Club of San
Francisco adopted the program as a way to help attract
talented young people to the opportunities available in
Cambridge. The Book Prize is awarded to an outstanding student in a high school's junior class who "combines excellence in scholarship and high character with
achievement in other fields." Generally the honoree is
selected by the school principal or guidance counselor.
