organizations and in education. Dr. Reich was an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Iowa and Harvard Medical School and Associate



Professor at Brown Medical School.

Currently James is in private practice in San Francisco, treating anxiety disorders and forensic psychiatry. He is a lecturer at the Harvard Combined Department of Psychiatry, Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at Stanford Medical School and Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at UC San Francisco.

Interested in anxiety and personality disorders. James founded the Association for Research in Personality Disorders. He is a board member of the International Society for the Study of Personality Disorders, a member of the Anxiety Disorder Association of America, and a Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association.

We will make our annual pilgrimage to the famous Año Nuevo beach to observe the largest mainland-breeding colony of Northern elephant seals.

The males battle for mates on the beaches and the females give birth to their pups on the dunes. It is a unique and unforgettable natural spectacle that thousands of peo-

ple come to witness each year.

During the breeding season, December 15 through March 31, daily access to

Cavell at UC Berkeley

February 5th and 6th, 4:00 pm Alumni House, UC Berkeley

Distinguished scholar, Prof. Stanley Cavell, will deliver the Howison Lectures in Philosophy.

His first lecture, *Philosophy the Day After Tomorrow: Moments in Nietzsche, Jane Austin, etc.*, is on February 5. His second talk, *The Wittgensteinian Event*, is on February 6, 2002. Both will be at the Toll Room at Alumni House.

A MacArthur Fellowship winner in 1992, Cavell holds the Walter Cabot Professorship at Harvard, where he joined the faculty in 1963, shortly after receiving his Ph.D. With an A.B. in music at UC Berkeley, in 1947, Cavell won the Morton Dauwen Zabel Award in Criticism from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters in 1985.
