ANNUAL DINNER FEATURING — the Head of NASA's Kepler Mission and the Former Under Secretary of Education

On February 2nd, 2011, NASA answered a question that humankind has pondered for centuries: "Are there other Earths?" The Kepler Mission, an orbiting telescope launched less than two years ago, has already discovered 1,235 new planets around other suns, and in February, NASA announced that five of these planets are rocky earth-sized worlds in the habitable zone of their suns, where liquid water could exist.

The **HCSF 2011 Public Service Leader of the Year Award** will be presented to Kepler Mission Head Scientist, William Borucki. Mr. Borucki was not only the scientific visionary behind Kepler, he also lobbied for decades to get the project off the ground while others dismissed the possibility of



discovering extrasolar planets as science fiction. Every new planet discovered by Kepler is a vindication of his life's work, and thanks to him, we're lucky to be in the first generation of humans to know that our solar system is not alone.

William Borucki is based at the NASA Ames Research Center in Silicon Valley. He began his career with NASA in 1962 and has contributed to a long list of scientific advancements, including heat shield design for the Apollo Missions. As Principal Investigator of the Kepler Mission, he oversees all scientific aspects of the program. Mr. Borucki will discuss the astonishing discoveries that Kepler has

The **HCSF 2011 Education Leader of the Year Award** will be presented to Sara Martinez Tucker, who most recently served as Under Secretary of Education (appointed by George W. Bush and confirmed by the Senate) where she was

the nation's top higher-education official overseeing all policies and programs related to postsecondary education, adult education and federal student aid. Earlier, Mrs. Tucker worked for nine years as the CEO and President of the Hispanic Scholarship Fund (HSF) where she raised \$280m for scholarships and launched programs to raise college expectations in Latino communities. Prior to her work in education, Mrs. Tucker spent 16 years at AT&T, where she led a \$400m division to its highest profit levels and became the first Latina to reach the company's executive level. Among her many awards and honors, Mrs. Tucker was named Hispanic of the Year in 2000 by Hispanic magazine, and, in 2005, Time magazine named her one of the 25 most influential Hispanics in the United States.



Mrs. Tucker has worked with HCSF in support of the Club's Early College Awareness Program in recent years. She will speak about the role the federal government plays in balancing the needs of a nation working to raise the readiness of its citizens in an increasingly competitive global market with the autonomy required for implementation at state and local levels.

Lecture Series

Professor Emeritus George Wright

What's Really Behind the Assault on Public Employee Unions?

A nation-wide assault on public worker unions has intensified in recent months. The justification for this assault put forward by advocates is that public-worker union pensions are responsible for state and local budget deficits. The results in the past year have been the roll back of the salaries and benefits of many public employees throughout the nation.

Moreover, in recent months this campaign has seen dramatic success in Wisconsin, Indiana, and Ohio, where collective bargaining for state employees have been effectively eliminated by Republican-controlled state governments. This assault is also occurring in many other states throughout the country, including California.

However, Professor Emeritus George Wright argues that there are greater political forces at play in the growing national fever to roll back the salaries and benefits of public employees. He contends that it's much more than just trying to balance a state budget, and, that it is also more than a Republican-led effort. President Obama, Gov. Jerry Brown, the Democratic Party and union leadership also come in for sharp criticism from Dr. Wright. He proposes that the assault on public worker unions is a coordinated campaign aimed: 1) to make public workers pay for national, state and local government's over-lapping financial crises; and, 2) to weaken, and possibly bust, public worker unions. He also contends that the Republican's objective is to eliminate the ability of public work unions to provide financial support to the Democratic Party.

Professor Wright's presentation will: 1) introduce his methodological framework; 2) provide historical background to the current assault on public worker unions, including why the assault has intensified in recent months; 3) rebut the arguments put forward to justify that assault; 4) provide an analysis of the ongoing responses by the working class to the assault throughout the country; and, 5) provide alternatives to addressing the current financial crisis. A Q&A period follows.

The Events Committee of the University Club is proud to present Professor Emeritus George Wright to launch the first in a revitalized Lecture Series for members and alumni. Professor Wright received his doctorate in Politics from the University of Leeds in 1987. Prior to that, he received his master's and bachelor's degrees in History from Chico State College, where he taught Political Science for over three decades. A San Francisco resident, he spends some of his time teaching History at Skyline College.

In conjunction with the HCSF Thought Leadership Series, The Harvard Club of San Francisco, the Harvard School of Public Health and the Harvard Alumni Association hosted a sold-out, 50-person event, *Populations in Danger: Humanitarian Crises and Human Rights at Harvard*, on February 7th in San Francisco.

In the one and a half hour session, the impact of poverty, oppression, wars, and disasters — and the threats they constitute to the welfare and wellbeing of millions of people throughout the world — were

discussed in detail. Harvard University is well underway in building the scholarly apparatus for analyzing and addressing these complex assaults on the human community.

Because the mechanisms for this combined assault on vulnerable populations are complex and changing rapidly — as the wars in Congo and Darfur, the 2010 disasters in Haiti and Pakistan, and the intractable tragedy of maternal and child mortality demonstrate all too clearly — the Harvard Humanitarian Initiative and the FXB Center for Health and Human Rights, along with other efforts at Harvard, are creating the knowledge base for anticipatory response and effective intervention. Harvard School of Public Health faculty and co-directors of the Harvard Humanitarian Initiative Jennifer Leaning and Michael VanRooyen described how these two centers of engagement are preparing the next generation of practitioners and academics to take the lead in understanding and improving conditions for people trapped in worldwide cycles of crisis and deprivation.

HCSF was honored to host a luncheon on January 21st for Drew Gilpin Faust, the 28th President of Harvard University and the Lincoln Professor of History in Harvard's Faculty of Arts and Sciences. The luncheon, attended by over 450 Bay Area Harvard Alumni, was the final component in a series of events in the Bay Area as part of Harvard College ReConnect, a program sponsored by the Harvard Alumni Association to celebrate the strength of the Harvard community in the West. Prior to the luncheon, President Faust met with members of the HCSF Board to discuss local priorities and objectives for Bay Area alumni.

Walter Isaacson AB '74, president and CEO of the Aspen Institute, and former chairman and CEO of CNN, moderated a discussion with President Faust. Among a variety of topics discussed, President Faust spoke about her efforts to expand financial aid to improve access to Harvard College for students of all economic backgrounds, the importance of increased federal funding for scientific research and her work to broaden the University's international reach. President Faust and Mr. Isaacson also discussed her efforts to raise the profile of the arts on campus, the role of sustainability in campus life and her work to increase collaboration across academic disciplines and administrative units throughout the University.
