We organized 96 events in the past twelve months thanks to the large number of volunteers on our vibrant activities committee and to the tireless efforts of co-VPs of Activities Charlene Nee, EdM '95 and Sheela Zemlin, MBA '98. With the help of incoming President Stephen Watkins, AM '96, and co-VPs of Community Service Lara Fox, AB '99, Preston Dodd, EdM '94, and Ray Mertens, AB '94 MBA '03, we have had a tremendous increase in the number and variety of community service activities including a deepening of our relationship with the Boys & Girls Clubs of San Francisco.

Beyond our countless social and community service events, The HCSF continued to bring the best of

HCSF: Committed to Community Service Lara Fox, AB '99

Thirty Harvard Club volunteers. Sixteen middle schools. Twelve professional and student panelists. One school auditorium. More than 250 students and parents seated at 9:30 on a fogless Saturday morning. What brought them together? The Early College Awareness Program (ECAP), a hallmark event held annually by ten Harvard Clubs around the country.

In San Francisco, we've taken the ECAP mandate—to provide information about the college application and financial aid process to the families of eighth graders who will likely become the first in their family to attend college—to the height of our abilities. We piloted the program in April 2006 at Aptos Middle School, where thirty-two audience members joined a small group of Harvard Club organizers and a powerhouse team of speakers for a morning-long seminar. A year later, we increased our attendance almost tenfold. We had engaged the help of thirty Harvard Club volunteers, a group of dedicated Boys & Girls Clubs staff members, the office of the Superintendent of Midd le Schools for San Francisco, and principals and counselors from schools around the city. The Club's Community Service Committee also organizes numerous other projects. With Habitat for Humanity, SF Homeless Connect, and Boys & Girls Clubs events already under our belt this year, HCSF members have shown an ongoing desire to take part in community service. Doing so offers you a meaningful way to engage with both the Harvard Club and the broader Bay Area communities.

The second (most recently hosted by Steve Senter, AB '68, and Debbie Hurst Senter, AB '68) is in mid-August, immediately after they receive their bulky envelopes full of Harvard's pre-enrollment material, e-mail addresses and dorm assignments. These parties are filled with the buzz of excitement as students begin to experience each other as future classmates. These are wonderful events; get involved at the very beginning!

Gypsy guitar legend Django Reinhardt, perhaps considered Europe's first true jazz star, revolutionized the way guitarists interpret the instrument. His virtuosic style—especially noteworthy considering he had full use of only two left hand fingers—is still emulated today by "gypsy jazz" fans throughout the world. Hike: San Bruno Mountain State and County Park

Saturday, November 10, 2007 Meeting time 10 am San Bruno Mountain State and County Park 555 Guadalupe Canyon Brisbane, CA

Just south of San Francisco, find the beauty in our neighboring city Brisbane by enjoying a local hike atop the San Bruno Mountain. The 3.5 mile loop to the summit is suitable for beginners, follows well-graded but rocky trails, and features bushels of native vegetation.

Ascending through chaparral, the path (on a clear day) sports panoramas of Montara Mountain, the Farallones, and the Pacific Ocean to the west. Other ridge vistas include downtown San Francisco, the East Bay hills, Mt. Diablo, and the Santa Cruz Mountains.

Bring your own water and food, and be prepared for wind and weather.

Directions:

- From US 101 in San Francisco County, exit #429B Cow Palace/Third Street. Drive south on Bayshore about 2 miles, turn right on Guadalupe Canyon Parkway and drive uphill about 2 miles to the park entrance on the right side of the road.
- From Interstate 280 in San Mateo County, exit #50 Mission Street, then take Market to Guadalupe Canyon Parkway and drive east to the park entrance on the left side of the road (it's about 3 miles from 280).

\$5 entrance fee (self-registration if kiosk is unstaffed). Maps available at the kiosk. Once past the kiosk, drive past the first lot, under the parkway to the trailhead on the south side of Guadalupe Canyon Parkway. Parking for about 20 cars. Restroom and pay phone available near the trailhead on the north side of Guadalupe Canyon Parkway. One designated handicapped parking spot, and trails may be wheelchair accessible with assistance. There is no direct public transportation to the park.

The HCSF has three core missions: community service, interviewing candidates for admission to Harvard College, and organizing social and educational events. We serve all alumni of Harvard regardless of school or degree, and our board is composed of graduates from almost every school at Harvard, including the Law School, Business School, School of Education, Divinity School, Kennedy School, GSAS, and College. We also include former Harvard instructors, current students, and parents of current and past students.

Founded in 1874, The Harvard Club of San Francisco is the fourth oldest Harvard Club in the world. However, unlike Boston and New York, we do not have a physical location. Instead, we leverage venues all around the city for our events and charge a modest membership fee of only \$50 per year (\$25 or less for recent grads). This dues revenue is what keeps us going.
