# An Illustrated Lecture Cities of the Silk Road Tuesday, January 23



Come to the University Club on Tuesday, January 23rd and join merchants and wayfarers along the ancient Silk Road to the exotic cities of Khiva, Bukhara, and legendary Samarkand - capital of mighty Tamerlane's empire. The rulers of these three cities, seats of powerful khanates, built magnificent palaces, mosques, and mausoleums, many of which have been richly restored by Soviet and Uzbek authorities.

During this fascinating

pictorial sojourn you will hear retired Foreign Service Officer, Frank Rettenberg ('52), describe the monumental architecture and unique social settings that he observed during his recent trip to Uzbekistan in June 1999. In the process, he will review the area's rich and complex historical legacy from the 10th Century Samanid dynasty through the transition from Russian to Soviet rule to independence. Mr. Rettenberg will also touch on this newly independent country's political, economic and environmental difficulties.


The Club has been able to reserve twenty places for Saturday,

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## Bugattis, Duesenbergs and Stutzes Blackhawk Museum Visit & Luncheon Saturday, March 3



On Saturday, March 3, we have arranged for a docent-led tour of the Blackhawk Automotive Museum in Danville, followed by a private lunch at the celebrated Blackhawk Grille.

The Blackhawk

Museum, which opened in 1988, showcases more than 100 classic cars from the Behring Collection in a setting which encourages visitors to experience the cars as works of art. Its collection is weighted toward custom-bodied classics, including Bugatti, Duesenberg, Daimler and Rolls-Royce. This year, the museum expanded its scope by becoming affiliated with the Smithsonian Institution in Washington in a program to bring portions of the Smithsonian collection to selected institutions around the country.

The current exhibition, "Smithsonian Treasures: Icons of American History," includes objects, photographs and paintings on loan from four different Smithsonian museums, including Isaac Singer's 1855 sewing machine, Edward Harrison May's 1869 painting of a Gilded Age dandy, a bronzed Joe Louis boxing glove and a series of sketches FDR made for U.S. stamps. There is also an exhibit on spiders, organized by the National Museum of Natural History.


We will meet at the museum at 10 a.m. for a one-hour docent-led tour of the first floor collection, followed by a free hour for visiting other parts of the museum. At noon, we will adjourn to the nearby Blackhawk Grille for a gourmet southwestern-style lunch (choice of

four entrees) in a private dining room. After lunch, there will be opportunities for browsing in the Blackhawk Plaza shops or further exploration of the museum.

To reach the museum, take Route 24 east to Walnut Creek, then I-680 south to the Crow Canyon Road exit. Head east (left from the freeway) on Crow Canyon Road for 4.2 miles, then turn right on Camino Tassajara, then take your first left (at the Movies 7 Theater) into Blackhawk Plaza, then your second right into the closest parking area. The Museum is on the hill above the gated Plaza entrance.

The cost of this event, including museum admission and lunch (but not wine or other bottled beverages) is \$45 per person. The number of people we can accommodate is limited, so make your reservation early.
